Newark, N.J. — March 2012 — The New Jersey Poison Information and Education System (NJPIES) will join poison centers around the country in celebrating the 50th Anniversary of National Poison Prevention Week March 18 through 24, 2012.

Since 1962, the President of the United States has proclaimed the third week of March as National Poison Prevention Week (NPPW) thereby focusing national attention on the dangers of poisonings and how to prevent them.

"NJPIES and America's other 56 poison centers are committed to safeguarding the health and well-being of every American through poison prevention and our free, confidential, expert medical services, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week," stated Dr. Steven Marcus, Executive and Medical Director of NJPIES. The NJ Poison Experts help those who have been exposed to poisons or just have questions about potential poisonings (the public) and those who need consultations with poison center toxicologists about treatment options for their patients (health care providers – including emergency room doctors and nurses). "Most calls from the public originate from people's homes and many of them can be resolved over the phone following the advice of our poison experts, thereby avoiding expensive and unnecessary trips to the emergency room," noted Dr. Marcus. Studies show that U.S. poison centers save millions of dollars in medical expenses each year; every \$1 spent on poison centers saves about \$7 in unnecessary health care costs.

SPRING INTO ACTION - MARCH 18-24, 2012

Since the first day of spring, March 20th, coincides with the beginning of National Poison Prevention Week, NJPIES encourages the public to "spring into action." It's an ideal time to take spring-cleaning to a new level and clean out your medicine cabinets, closets and pantries, garages and sheds. All medicines and toxic substances should be **locked up** and out of sight.

Poisonings span a lifetime; they can occur anywhere, at any time, to anyone (toddlers, teens, adults, and seniors). "Poisonings are a danger to us all. They don't just happen to children, in fact, most people who die from poisons are adults, not children," stated Bruce Ruck, Pharm.D., NJPIES. "There are easy steps to take to protect yourself and your loved ones. As part of the week's ongoing activities, we will post daily safety tips on our Facebook page (<u>www.facebook.com/nipies</u>) and Twitter (<u>@NJPoisonCenter</u>)," Be a poison prevention superhero - share poison prevention tips with your family (including children), friends, and coworkers.

"We are using National Poison Prevention Week and the entire month of March to highlight our 24/7 accessibility to the public, stated Dr. Marcus. "There are no silly questions, and trained staff are always available to answer a question, quell a fear, provide advice, or intervene to get emergency services on site and prepped to provide the needed protocol in the fastest response time." He added, "When in doubt, check it out - Prevention is truly the best possible medicine."

The NJ poison experts recommend putting the number in all family cell phones as well as programming it as a speed dial number on landlines (home and office). In addition, prominently post the number near all phones in the home and office.

About NJPIES

As New Jersey's only poison control center, the New Jersey Poison Information & Education System provides information on poison prevention and treatments. Chartered in 1983, NJPIES provides free consultation through telephone hot line services and the Web. Medical professionals such as physicians, registered nurses and pharmacists offer confidential advice regarding poison emergencies and provide information on poison prevention, drugs, food poisoning, animal bites and more. These specialists are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

NJPIES coordinates state poison education and research and is designated as the regional poison center by the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services and the American Association of Poison Control Centers. It tracks incidences of adverse reactions to food, drugs and vaccines in order to monitor potential public health issues and provide data to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. A division of the Department of Preventive Medicine and Community Health of the New Jersey Medical School of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey. NJPIES has a state-of-the-art center located on the school's Newark campus.
